### **REQUIRED MATERIALS**

Note: MUSX 140 — Recital Attendance (0 cr.) is required of all music majors for seven semesters and music minors for two semesters with a minimum of ten recitals per semester. Canvas Access:

#### **Email Access:**

- Students are required to use and maintain a current vandals.uidaho.edu email address. It is the student's responsibility to regularly check their university provided email account. Digital Device with Internet Access:
  - The University of Idaho has moved to an online ticketing system and the LHSOM is now a part of that system. Any and all records of concert attendance will be done digitally.

# CRITERIA AND REQUIREMENTS FOR FINAL GRADE

#### (READ CAREFULLY)

MUSX 140 is a pass/fail course. You must be enrolled BEFORE you can receive any attendance credit.

- Registered students are required to attend ALL OF THE FOLLOWING:
  - a. Five (5) School of Music Convocation Recitals during each semester enrolled in MUSX 140. They are presented on Thursdays at 2:30 p.m. as listed on the Convocation Schedule. Students must attend all Convocation Recitals! If you have a conflict, please refer to the attendance policy outlined below.
  - b. Five (5) faculty or guest artist recitals/concerts.
  - c. **Five (5) additional performances.** These can be student recitals, School of Music large ensemble concerts, etc.
- 2. Students can find these events on the <u>Idaho Cultural Events Calendar</u>. Within this calendar you may choose from the following options to fulfill the course requirements:
  - a. Lionel Hampton School of Music.
  - b. Auditorium Chamber Music Series (All count as Faculty/Guest)\*\*
    - i. Use the Student Portal link
  - c. Lionel Hampton Jazz Festival\*\* (These do NOT count as Faculty/Guest)

- 3. **PROCEDURE:** For a student to receive attendance credit, they will receive an email through their vandals.uidaho.edu email account that contains a QR code for an upcoming event. These emails are automatically generated for convenience. Receiving these emails do not indicate a requirement to attend that specific event with exception of the Convocation Recitals. Also, the QR code **is NOT considered a ticket** to that event. The code is used for tracking purposes only. **For most concerts and recitals, you will need to pay to gain entry.** \$12 for adults, \$10 for students and senior citizens. Student recitals are free.
  - a. If you plan to attend that event, you will present the QR code emailed to you (print the QR code if you do not have a digital device) to a member of the production crew BEFORE THE EVENT to receive credit for attending that event.
    - Digital Attendance will not be recorded after 10 minutes beyond the published start time of an event.
  - b. Each scan will be time stamped to reflect the beginning and ending of an event. If you do not scan twice, **you will not receive credit**. Physical Programs will not be will not be taken in lieu of a missing scan. **NO SCAN = NO CREDIT**.
  - c. IT IS THE STUDENT'S RESPONSIBILITY TO LOCATE THE PERSON(S) SCANNING FOR EVENTS.
- 4. Students will not receive credit for events in which they perform, except for Convocation Recitals.
- 5. Please be aware the event calendar is subject to change without notice. It is best to complete the required ten recitals early in the semester to avoid the last minute rush. Do not allow the cancellation of a recital late in the semester be the determining factor for not completing the requirements for this course. NOTE: Each Jazz Festival night concert counts for one recital/concert.
- 6. **AUDIENCE COURTESY IS EXPECTED.** Students must not use any analog or digital devices (cell phones, tablets, computers, etc.) while attending a concert. Please give your full attention to those on stage. If caught using a device, the student **will not receive credit for that specific event**. You will be notified via email.
- 7. Recital Attendance is automatically recorded, but it will be **the student's** responsibility to keep track of what was attended.

No food or drink except for bottled water is allowed inside the Haddock Performance Hall or the University Auditorium.

Cheating in this course will not be tolerated; student and instructor responsibilities regarding dishonesty are outlined in the University's Student Code of Conduct (see below)

#### ATTENDANCE POLICY

**EXCUSED ABSENCES:** Absences from Convocation are determined at the discretion of the instructor and are typically restricted to medically documented illness, documented family emergency, or a documented school-sponsored event (e.g. geology department excursion).

- The burden of proof is on the student, and the instructor reserves the right to determine which absences are considered excused.
- Participation in rehearsals is imperative for obvious reasons. If you are sick, please stay home and get well. Make up work will be assigned.

- For an absence to be considered excused, you must notify your instructor in advance of the absence (minimum 24 hours).
- A written excuse form (available on-line at the course website) must be dated and signed by you and turned into the course instructor.
- The notification must be in an email to the course instructor.
- Please go to the student health center or urgent care and have a note provided for my records.

**UNEXCUSED ABSENCES**: The pass/fail grade for MUSX 140 is based on successful completion of ten recitals/concerts and all Convocation performances. Unless previously discussed with the course instructor, all absences will be unexcused.

- Expose students, through live performances, to a variety of musical genres, literature, media, and interpretive styles as models for their own performance practice, at both professional and peer levels.
- Provide performing experiences for music majors in studio classes, area recitals and convocation performances.
