As part of the Cooperative Extension Service, 4-H has been a part of our state for over 100 years. Here in Canyon County, our history is a bit complicated. Records at the UI College of Agriculture and Life Sciences shows that youth programs started well before 4-H had a name and emblem.

Before there were county offices, there were state level employees doing Extension work in various parts of Idaho. In 1912, the state superintendent of public instruction took charge of "boys' and girls' club work" throughout the state. In 1914, the Smith-Lever Act was passed by the United States Congress. This act formally created the Cooperative Extension Service.

Before the Smith-Lever Act, Canyon County Extension was born. In March 1913 Harry Ireland was appointed as the first Canyon County Extension "agent". (Extension agents was the term used for what are now called Extension educators.) Harry Ireland's successor as county agent, W. T. McCall, became the first state "4-H club leader". UI records indicate that "Canyon County's early county agents were enthusiastic supporters of 4-H club activities." Further, "With the help of the county superintendent of schools, Z. Fay Fowler, the county agents organized 4-H groups, principally pig clubs, in Canyon County."

The Canyon County Extension office has records of early Extension work going back to the 1939 annual report. On page 8 of this report, it lists a page and a half of "Historical Review of Extension Work in Canyon County". These few pages describe a 14-year lapse from 1924 to 1938 where a county agent was not employed in Canyon County. The agent at the time, Buford Kuhns lists the Great Depression and a decline in the "sponsoring organization", the Farm Bureau as the reason. However, during this time, three district agents kept Extension work going, giving the most attention to 4-H.

We hope to share some more from our historical collection throughout the year and especially during the Canyon County Fair!

2023 Canyon County Fair Market Tag and Declaration Information

Tips on Meeting Your Animals Nutrient Requirements

Nutrient requirements can be broken up into four basic components: Growth, Maintenance, Reproduction, and Lactation. We'll start by covering Growth & Maintenance.

Growth Requirements:

Species, breed, sex, age, and genetic potential can all factor into the growth requirements of animals!

- As animals gain weight - nutrient requirements will decrease until mature weights are met.
- Younger, lower weighing, animals have higher nutrient requirements for growth when compared to older, heavier weighing, animals.
 - For example - animals in the growing phase require more protein when compared to animals in the finishing phase.
- Different species of animals require different nutrients.
 - For example - ruminant animals, like cattle, can synthesize their own B and K vitamins, therefore, low quantities are required in their diet.
- Animals who are bred to be more feed EFFICIENT will require less nutrients for growth when compared to INEFFICIENT animals this is determined by average daily gain and feed to gain ratios - animals who can eat less and grow more are considered efficient.

Maintenance Requirements:

Like growth requirements species, breed, sex, age, and genetic potential can all factor into the maintenance requirements of animals!

- Once animals reach their mature weight they will roll over into the maintenance phase. All basic nutrients are still required water, energy, protein, vitamins, and minerals; however, they are needed in LOWER quantities.
- Maintenance is met by supplying the nutrients needed to keep the animal alive. If you fall below nutrient requirements animals may have a harder time staying warm, digesting feed, being active, and maintaining body weight.
- Larger animals still have higher maintenance requirements when compared to smaller animals.
- If animals encounter rough terrain or drastic changes in weather maintenance requirements can change.
 - For example - Animals will tend to eat more feed as the temperature drops below freezing. Animals will also tend to go off feed as the temperature warms up, so provide feed according to the weather to keep up with requirements.

Understanding Requirements:

- Understanding that requirements change drastically throughout an animal's life can help you become a more efficient animal raiser/owner.
- If wanting to grow your herd, make sure you are providing your pregnant/lactating animals with enough nutrients to increase pregnancy numbers and efficiency.
- If you are raising 4-H projects - SUCCESSFULLY meeting the early growth requirements will help you hit target market weights easier than blindly feeding your animals.
- Paying close attention to your animal requirements can help you save money as you are more likely to be meeting requirements vs overfeeding.
 - Using precision feeding techniques can help cut feed cost as you only feed exactly what is required - helps minimize feed wastage.

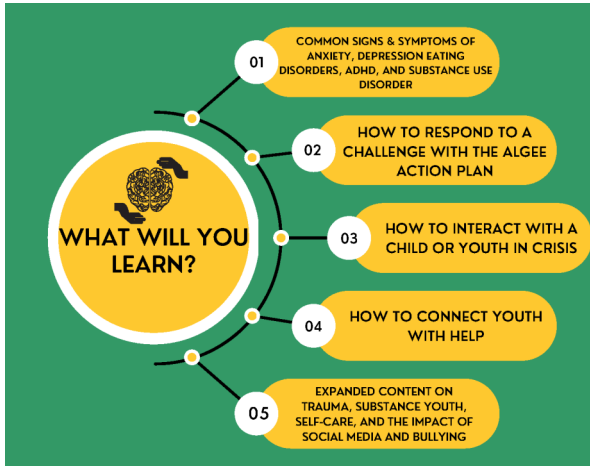

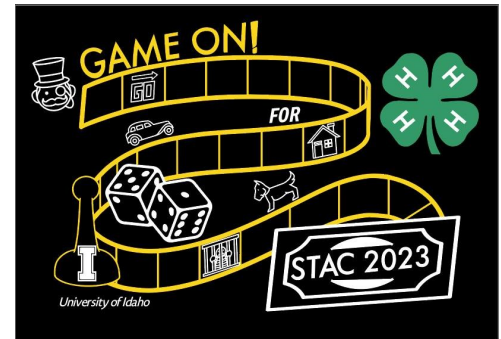
### About the Event

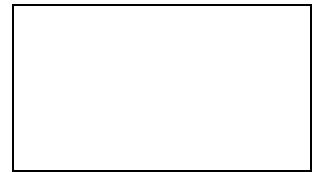
